

HELL ON THE BORDER 2025 SASS SOUTHWEST REGIONAL **CHAMPIONSHIP**

■or me, it all started in June of 2024 at the Butterfield Trail Triple Classic in Branson, MO. Naildriver attended the awards ceremony to promote his event. Well, thanks to that visit my roommate from that shoot won a free entry to Hell on the Border.

During the trip home, Outlaw Waylon (SASS #112644) and I came to an agreement, if he drives I'll provide the accommodations.

Waylon and I did not have the opportunity to arrive early to Arkansas. It's that four letter word, W-O-

R-K... On the trip down Wednesday, our route took us, literally, past the entrance to the range from our previous excursion in Branson, only two and a half hours more to drive. I didn't mind that the route took us down some two-lane highways. Rural





and small-town Arkansas has a cultural charm that I like to visit upon occasion. No worries, we are both RO2 qualified, so the Wednesday RO1 classes offered were not necessary and even though we missed the first two opportunities for warm up stages, we caught the third offering the next day.

After a late breakfast at the hotel, Waylon's navigator took him down a rough gravel road. We tooled along at about 20 mph when we passed an orange sign "End Construction." I made a sarcastic comment, "Oh yeah, the road is so much better on this side of the sign than it was on the other" as

we continued to tool along at 20mph. The range sits at the crossroads of gravel roads but I do have to speculate that the road construction and equipment we spotted may be making way for pavement by the next major match at the Old Fort Gun Club.

Despite the crude public infrastructure leading to the facility, arrival made it well worth the trip. Ample parking close to "Main Street" revealed the most elaborate shooting structures I have ever seen. The Fort displayed faux stone concrete pillars. The Jail, the same with rod iron bars. The Gallows, 15 feet high; I could go on and on...

Waylon and I did not have time to prepare for the three stages of Wild Bunch and we both left our cap and ball revolvers at home, so no Plainsman match for us either. Maybe next year. One thing Waylon and I have in common is we are both bargain hounds. We spent our first couple hours at the range checking out the offerings of the vendors and thoroughly scouring the Cowboy Swap Meet. Our shopping allowed us to save a little ammunition, as we decided to forego the side matches as well.

With our wallets a little lighter and new treasures in our gun cart, that afternoon brought the opportunity to blow out the cobwebs accumulated from an entire winter of canceled local matches due to the Midwest winter weather. I found the three warm up matches a refreshing change to my normal competition routine. While run like a normal match, nobody was documenting times. Results were verbally relayed to the shooter, then onto the next contestant. Not caring about my performance allowed me to push my limits, which served to really help clear out the cobwebs and bring back my muscle memory.

In my experience with our sport, I have always prided myself on picking up stage instructions on-the-fly. At the very least, I hang back and let a few shooters ahead of me to allow me to learn from their mistakes or learn from a few crafty observers a little better way to shoot a stage differently from the rest of the posse. Upon returning to the hotel, I decided to break from my norm and actually take a look at the five stages our afternoon flight was to encounter the next day. I'm glad I did. Maybe it was my mindset, maybe it was some remaining cobwebs in my brain, but I picked up the telephone and called Waylon in his room so we could get together for a "study session." It wasn't that the stages were overly complicated, and no, they weren't full of "P" traps. It was just that there were new patterns I had not seen on some and on others, a reorientation of patterns that I had seen before. It took a minute or two of studying each stage to pick up these patterns.

The warm Arkansas spring weather had pop-up local downpours of rain,









but I am glad to say that those squalls were fortunately timed to avoid direct interference with the event. Oftentimes we would drive through the remnants of a shower that just passed through minutes prior.

The shooter meeting for the first day of the main match was met with great enthusiasm by Holy Smoke Harmon (SASS #84590) followed by a sincerely heartfelt prayer and an acapela rendition of the national anthem — that has left a lasting impression on me still — performed by Tonic Kid (SASS #70340).

That day, I realized I was participating in a major match farther from home than I had ever traveled before. I am always amused at watching the formality between strangers on a new posse break down as the event progresses. It didn't matter how far I was from home, I was at a SASS event. I knew I was surrounded by new friends I had not yet met. Breaking the ice was easy and after five stages of working with truly professional ambassadors of the "spirit of the game," we left the range that afternoon with a touch of that infectious spirit.

With our first five stages, I had not spent any time at the other end of "Main Street." I found exploring each new stage structure to be an enhancement to the atmosphere. I admired the detail, quality, and thoughtfulness dedicated to each of the buildings. For example, upon entering the courthouse, I noted reflective insulation installed up high in an open-air building. I couldn't figure out why someone would take the time to install such a thing. It wasn't until I left the building that I figured it out. The reflective surface brought light into the structure... clever!

Back at the hotel, the shooter packet included a dining guide. Well, let's just say that Fort Smith is a small city. Restaurant and hotel offerings are pretty much the packaged franchises you'll see on the blue signs as you roll past the next interstate exit. Perhaps if we had used the Yelp app, we would have found a better variety in local cuisine.

After dinner, a brief overview of the final five stages did not require a study session. Still, they were written in patterns I had not seen before, but simple enough to pick up on the fly. (Maybe it's because I had finally cleared out the rest of the cobwebs.) I had begun to embrace the learning experience of participating outside my comfort zone.

The following morning on the range our flight started quietly with little fanfare, just down to business with the professionalism from our posse that we had experienced the day before. Our final five stages ended with a posse of 17 newly-found friends shaking hands, hugging the ladies, exchanging some contact information, and a general sense of camaraderie.

We had ended our morning flight, just at the right time to have built up an appetite. Food on the range was provided by Cavanaugh Church — \$10 for a burger, chips, beverage and a cookie with proceeds that went to feed the homeless.

As we headed to the car to load up, Naildriver rolled past in a side-by-side utility vehicle. I had made his acquaintance at past matches in Branson over the years. I have always had the impression from him that he is an approachable individual with a gentlemen's demeanor. Having an opportunity to address him in his role as Match Director, in passing, I said, "My compliments to your stage writer."

"I will let Ambler know." was his reply with a smile.

Upon returning to the hotel, we found ourselves with a little free time that afternoon. It is said that "idle hands are the devil's workshop," but fear not, because Judge Parker's Marshals provided us an afternoon of entertainment with complimentary tickets to the U. S. Marshals Museum.

Back again at the hotel later that afternoon, why clean guns when you can take a nap? I awoke, dressed, and met Waylon in the lobby with my best Cowboy duds on in preparation for the awards banquet.

We made our way — a short drive across town — to Kay Rogers Park. The exhibition hall was, well, quite Spartan, as it pertains to décor. But the tables were set with linen tablecloths, and napkins. Salads, dinner rolls, iced tea and water were already served for each setting when we found our seats.

As we wandered around the venue checking out the raffle prizes and the belt buckles we were certain neither of us earned, we were approached by Ambler (SASS #80374). I got the impression he had not received the message I had left with Naildriver earlier. However, the topic of conversation with was that he was truly interested in our opinion of the stages. "My opinion? As a local Match Director, I believe you have written my stages for me for the next two months." I had so much fun with his stages that I chose to take them with me and introduce them to my friends back home. The impression of my conversation with Ambler left me believing he genuinely sought feedback despite the fact he had already performed a first-rate job. To me, this is a sign of work ethic and humility. Again, great job, Ambler!

As we returned to our seats, we were greeted by a couple who by coincidence were from a different part of our home state. This made for interesting dinner conversations. Just because we didn't know each other, we did know quite a few common acquaintances.

I found amusement in a seldom-noticed detail on everyone's name badge. On each badge there was an outline of the state of Arkansas. What few people noticed was the abbreviation of their home state was printed in small letters in the lower right corner of that outline. It was fun to catch people off guard greeting them with this tidbit of unspoken information.

As our main course was served, the skies opened up in a torrential thunderstorm roaring through the metal roof above us. We stayed warm and dry as we enjoyed our beef served over steamed potatoes, drizzled with olive oil and seasoned to perfection, and applauded as the best shooters received the recognition they deserved. This event was well worth the trip, making the drive down was worth the southern hospitality that I have grown accustomed to receiving when I visit the State of Arkansas. Waylon and I will be back April 22-25, 2026. I hope to see you there too.

This rings completely true, as she, along with her husband Pike Coyle (SASS #8843), have been the guiding force behind Bordertown for many years and have been instrumental in taking it from being merely the Arizona State Championship to being a match that truly everyone wants to attend. To this day, Bordertown typically sells out within a few weeks, which elevates it to the status of another EOT or Land Run. Quicksand's legacy will not be soon forgotten.


COMIC BOOK CORNER


nlike today, westerns were extremely popular in all types of entertainment media during the 1950s and there were a passel of western titles on the comic book racks. Costumed super heroes were also starting to make a comeback, so a number of creators came up with the notion to combine the two genres into masked cowboy adventures. The Lone Ranger was perhaps the first, having in fact appeared during the heyday of super heroes, and he was soon copied by many more, including Black Diamond, the Durango Kid, and the Ghost Rider (originally a cowboy, not a motorcycle-riding flaming skeleton).

American Comics Group (ACG) jumped on the masked cowboy bandwagon fairly quickly with the late-1950 appearance of the Hooded Horseman in issue 14 of Blazing West. Illustrated by comic book veteran Ogden Whitney, the Hooded Horseman proved popular enough to take over the title of the magazine and run through mid-1954. This issue of The Cowboy Chron*icle* presents the first appearance of the Hooded Horseman and we will reprint a few more in coming digital issues. 


Ten Stages of Straight-Shooting



Crisco (SASS #3621) of Washington started off the festivities and competition by instructing participants in a Range Officer Safety course on Tuesday, July 15. According to the new requirements for Range Officer training, there is a basic safety class for both shooting disciplines, and it is followed by specific workshops for Wild Bunch Safety and for Cowboy Action Shooting™. A dozen participants

attended Crisco's Range Officer Basic Safety Training. Thank you Crisco for coming to Montana to teach the course.

The State Wild Bunch Match attracted 31 participants. Ten stages were shot over two days, July 16 and 17, with the match stages taking place in the morning followed by Wild Bunch Side Matches in the afternoon each day. This year those side matches consisted of Doughboy, Teddy Roosevelt, Speed Rifle, Speed Pistol, and Fastest Magazine Change.

Crisco walked away with First Place Overall as well as in the Modern Category, followed by Hoss Shoer (SASS #95595). First place Senior Traditional went to Jeremiah Jonathan (SASS #50325) with Johnny Pinebox (SASS #58074L) as Montana State Senior Traditional. First for Traditional went to Little Gunder (SASS #30178). Senior Modern Lady went to May B. Shecann and Senior Traditional Lady was earned by Owl Eye Olga (SASS #94036).

The Wild Bunch Side Matches scores were as: 1st Place in Doughboy — Hoss Shoer; 1st place in Teddy Roosevelt — Hardtack Henry (SASS #5967). The Speed Pistol title belongs to Hoss Shoer. Speed Rifle was won by Samuel Dunbin Hadley (SASS #93613). Speed Shotgun also went to Samuel Dunbin Hadley. Crisco took the award for Fastest Mag Change (11.62 seconds) in which five rounds were shot with one round per magazine. Yep! My math says five magazines. That's FAST!

The Cowboy Action shoot (July 18t – 20t) consisted of the twelve-stage main match, four stage warm-up match, and a variety of side matches including long range, speed, derringer, pocket pistol, cowboy clays, and the Schuetzen.

Fairbanks Sam placed first in the Warm-Up Match, MT Jughead took second, and Johnny Pinebox came in third. The top three women were May B. Shecann, Alberta Annie (SASS #85914), and Pops Double Trouble (SASS #95215),

who all scored within ten seconds of each other.

Seventy shooters were registered for the main match. Overall Top Gun was earned by Samuel Dunbin Hadley of Idaho. Mountain Man Mayhem (SASS #113354) also of Idaho came in second place, followed by Hardtack Henry in third place. The rest of the top ten included Washington State's Crisco (fourth), Hoss Shoer of Montana (fifth), and Territorial Ryder (SASS #31939) of Oregon (sixth). Montana's own MT Jughead brought home the seventh place overall plaque, with two Albertans, Alberta Annie and D'Professor (SASS #102737) coming in eighth and ninth respectively, followed by Nevada shooter Fairbanks's Sam (SASS #95103) in tenth.

Samuel Dunbin Hadley and Alberta Annie were the Top Guns for the match. Both have attended the Montana State Championship numerous times and this was the year for each to shine.

The woman to earn the Montana State Champion buckle for the eleventh time was May B. Shecann. Hardtack Henry was the Men's Montana State Champion for the third time. Congratulations to both for their consistent wins as the Montana champs!


Only two folks completed the main match with a clean shoot. Well done Alberta Annie and Navy Davy (SASS #107951) of Arizona!

Stuart Montana, now a two-time winner of this prestigious event.

HELLFIRE AT BEAVER CREEK 2025 TRI-STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

he 2025 Tri-State Championship representing Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island is usually held in the state of Massachusetts at the Harvard Sportsmen's club. Since I started shooting eight years ago, this is where the tri-state has always been held. This year the tri-state committee had a hard choice to make. With some recent gun law changes in the state of Massachusetts, the committee found that it would be difficult for non-residents to attend the match and worried that attendance would be affected. Their options were to host a match that would probably result in low attendance because of the new gun laws or to not host the match at all. With no other club in the Massachusetts, Connecticut, or Rhode Island area large enough to host a state championship match for 100-plus shooters And 30-plus campers, it left the Tri-State committee with the decision not to host a tri-state championship. This was a difficult decision to be made, so the Maine Marshals decided to extend an offer to the Tri-State committee. The Maine Marshals offered to run the match and host the match at their club in Berwick, Maine where the Maine state championship is held. The Tri-State committee met and agreed this was the best option so the Tri-State Championship could be held this





year. The Maine Marshals' club is only about an hour and 15 minutes from the Harvard Sportsmen's club. The decision was made in late November and then the work really began. The Maine Marshals filed with SASS to host the Tri-State Championship and were approved by mid December. The Tri-State is typically held the first week in June and this left the Maine marshals with six months to write, design, and promote a second state championship match for their club.

Six months flew by in a blink of an eye and the next thing you knew, Hellfire over Beaver Creek was underway in the great state of Maine. The Maine Marshals were able to round up 85 registered shooters, with a total

of 74 shooters shooting the match. The Marshals were also able to posse up 28 sponsors for the match having almost 20 different raffle items including 10,000 primers, a Sig Sauer P320, and a Ruger Vaquero. The match also had Addy's on-site food truck that provided lunch each day and then provided a catered Italian dinner on Saturday night, including traditional Italian dishes like chicken parm and veal parm and desserts like tiramisu and triple chocolate cake. The match also had a potluck dinner on Friday night and a campfire each and every night. The Maine Marshals even opened up their own saloon and had a custom built faro board where pards could come and place bets and learn how to play faro.

QUIGLEY'S REDEMPTION 2025 AUSTRALIAN BLACK POWDER TERRITORIAL CHAMPIONSHIP DELIVERS THRILLS AND CHILLS

TRALIA — The dust has settled, the smoke has cleared, and The 2025 SASS Australian Black Powder Territorial Championship, affectionately known as Quigley's Redemption, has wrapped up in mid-July (mid-winter in the southern hemisphere). This marks the fifth year for the unique black powder shoot and its inaugural year as a SASS-sanctioned match, drawing 30 shooters, including three talented Buckarettes, to tackle an exciting eight-stage competition.

Organizers put a distinct spin on this event, with every participant starting the match with a coveted Clean Match Pin. It was then up to the shooters to either maintain their perfect record or strategically double down on a bonus target to earn an extra pin or even recover a lost one. Many, including the organizer, Whiskey Rae, admitted to "stuffing up" and ringing the bell in good-humored defeat.

Stages were designed to be both fun and challenging, with a nod to classic black powder scenarios rarely seen elsewhere in Australia. Competitors found themselves in whimsical situations like remembering to re-cork a bottle after the buzzer, bouncing a kangaroo off a table, or even having bells "chase" them.

One particularly memorable stage required shooters to re-assemble their shotguns after firing to knock down two final targets.

The course design thoughtfully considered windage, allowing the tell-tale black powder smoke to either aid or hinder the shooter. The secret weapon for visibility? "Hot Lips" Hot Pink Paint, which proved a winner the last five years in cutting through the smoky haze.

While days were pleasant, Saturday night brought a true taste of winter, with temperatures plummeting to -3°C (26°F). Thankfully, a delicious meal from

Her guns were acquired by "The Guerilla's" to keep her legacy alive. "The Guerilla's" also ran The Queensland Black Powder Championships for many years, also providing inspiration and help.

A massive thank you was extended to all participants for their support, and to those who stepped up to help. Special appreciation also went to Ruby Ruthless (SASS #105922) of SASS for her invaluable help and guidance in making this first SASS-sanctioned match a success.

Despite the fun, organizers are still aiming to convince more people to "come to the dark side" and join the black powder community, not just for the camaraderie, but also for the promise of delicious cookies.



THE TARIFF ISSUE OF THE LATE NINETEENTH CENTURY

ariffs have been around since the early years of the American republic. The first tariff was passed in 1789. It was a key part of Alexander Hamilton's plan to raise money for the federal government and to increase manufacturing in the United States. After the War of 1812, tariffs became even more important because we learned the hard way that we needed to produce our own manufactured goods. They stimulated the growth of industry in the U.S. just as they were intended to do. In addition, they helped fund the federal government. During some years, tariffs accounted for more than 90 percent of the government's revenue.

Opponents of the tariff argued that they raised the price of consumer goods. In the 1820s and 30s the northern and southern states were at odds with each other over the issue. Tariffs were great for the emerging textile industry in New England, but not so great for the cotton producing southern states. They raised the prices of manufactured goods, especially textiles and tools. Since the tariffs were designed to make British goods less competitive, southern politicians argued they were being enslaved by northern business interests. The debate became rancorous after Congress passed the so-called Tariff of Abominations in 1828, which raised the cost of imported goods by 50 percent. Eventually, the dispute was smoothed over with a compromise tariff, but the tariff issue was a major bone of contention between the North and South before the Civil War. It wasn't nearly as divisive as slavery, but it helped contribute to the onset of the conflict.

After the Civil War ended, tariffs generally remained high. There was no federal income tax, so they were a primary source of revenue for the U.S. government. Furthermore, they promoted American manufacturing, which

was starting to grow at an explosive rate. They were favored by the Republican Party, which supported industrial interests, and opposed by the Democratic Party, which tended to support agricultural interests. Since the national Democratic Party was in tatters after the South lost the war, there was little effective opposition to protective tariffs.

By the late nineteenth century, high tariffs began to make less sense. The government was making more of its income through excise taxes, the military was small, there were no social programs (unless you want to count pensions for Union Army veterans), and the production of U.S. manufactured goods and steel had surpassed that of Great Britain. American industry was no lon-

ger in its infancy and had become part of the world economy. By 1883, tariffs had lowered to around 30 percent. That was high compared to most of the twentieth century, but lower than they had been for much of the nineteenth.

In 1884, Americans elected Grover

The McKinley tariff bill, now before Congress, which might be characterized as protectionism run mad, has singularly failed to effect its purpose in one of its provisions aimed at the Canadian farmer. The bill increases the import tax on barley from 10c. to 30c. per bushel; the object of the increase is to shut out the eight or twelve million bushels of barley yearly imported from Ontario, in the interest of the western farmer.


Cleveland, a former governor of New York, in a bitterly contested election against the Republican candidate, James G. Blaine. Cleveland was the first Democrat to win a presidential election since the end of the Civil War. Though he was staunchly pro-business, he was a reformer who wanted to regulate the railroads, end political corruption, control inflation, and lower tariffs. He wasn't particularly successful in any of those pursuits, except that during Cleveland's first administration, Congress did pass the Interstate Commerce Act, which attempted to curb some of the railroad industry's most blatantly unfair practices. Ultimately, the law was defanged by its own vague language, but it was a step in the right direction. It's not a coincidence that railroad executives were often portrayed as villains in Western movies. Cleveland's attempts to lower tariffs went nowhere.

Cleveland was defeated in the next presidential election by Benjamin Harrison, who was in many ways a Republican version of Cleveland except that he supported high tariffs. The election of 1888 was also closely contested and resulted in Cleveland winning the popular vote while losing the electoral vote. It is argued in some sources that Cleveland's support of lower tariffs helped to cause his defeat. Harrison, known as "Little Ben" for his squat stature, was an ethical, hard-working, stiff and formal politician who was about as exciting as a stout bowl of oatmeal without sugar or milk.

The time-honored Republican political tactic after the Civil War was

called "waving the bloody shirt," which served to remind people it was the Democrats in the South who started the Civil War. (Actually, nobody ever waved a bloody shirt; it referred to an urban legend about Benjamin Butler's speech in 1871 about the activities of the KKK.) Literal or not, it was an effective reminder that Democrats were the party of treason, rebellion, and resistance to Reconstruction. Northern Democrats, it was inferred, were a subspecies of the same viper. In fact, Northern Democrats were referred to as "Copperheads" during the war.

By 1884, the year Cleveland won the presidential election, the "bloody shirt" tactic had grown stale. However, protective tariffs still resonated with Republicans, since they appealed to business interests. The GOP had been allied to industry since its founding in the 1850s and became even more so as the nineteenth century progressed. In recent years, tariffs had been dropping, so they were revived as part of the Harrison campaign. The issue brought considerable campaign donations from wealthy tycoons. According to some sources, it helped tip the election in Harrison's favor.

Congressman William McKinley of Ohio was the spokesman for raising the tariff after Harrison won the Election of 1888. In a speech before the House of Representatives, McKinley claimed high tariffs raised "manly aspirations" by encouraging American manufacturing. The Tariff Act of 1890, signed into law by Harrison, which became known as the McKinley Tariff, raised tariffs to 49.5 percent on foreign goods, protecting iron and steel, but also raised rates on textiles, tinware, as well as many assorted foods, and tools. These were the highest tariff rates since the "Tariff of Abominations" of 1828.


The McKinley Tariff, "manly aspirations" notwithstanding, immediately raised the cost of consumer goods because foreign nations responded with tariffs of their own. Public out-

cry against it was immediate and bitter. The increase in tinware was especially resented because tin was essentially the nineteenth century version of plastic. The same year the Mckinley Tariff became law, the Democrats won the congressional elections by a landslide. Congressman McKinley, the so-called Tariff King, was voted out. Even some Republicans thought the tariff was too high; Secretary of State Blaine, Cleveland's former opponent in 1884, got so riled up before a Senate committee that he drove his fist through his silk top hat.

Grover Cleveland ran against Harrison again in 1892 and won both the popular vote and the electoral vote. This made him the first president to serve two nonconsecutive terms, (We all know who became the second president to be elected for nonconsecutive terms.) Litte Ben wasn't only defeated by the tariff issue; his stance on other economic issues and his own colorless personality doomed his bid for reelection. Another factor in Harrison's defeat probably involved his signing the Sherman Anti-Trust Act into law. It was rendered toothless by its vague language, but it probably cost him some campaign donors.

Less than a month before Cleveland's second inauguration, the United States was hit with an economic crisis called the Panic of 1893. It was touched off by the collapse of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad, but there were many underlying causes. The entire railroad industry was overreached, wheat prices had been falling, and the switch from the gold standard to the silver standard had caused disorder in the currency system. To make matters worse, there was an oversupply of silver due to new strikes in Colorado and Nevada. The McKinley Tariff made the economic crisis even more painful for the average American because it disrupted international trade and raised consumer prices.

True to his platform, Cleveland supported a lower tariff. Unfortunately, the Wilson-Gorman Tariff, passed in 1894, had little effect on the economic crisis. This was one of the worst depressions in American history prior to the Great Depression and lasted until 1897. The new tariff was amended to the point where it was only marginally lower than McKinley's. Cleveland

allowed it to become law without signing it because he figured a watereddown reform was better than no reform at all. Cleveland's second term was not a raging success, he had to contend with a nationwide strike and the ongoing depression.

The Republican party nominated William McKinley to run for president in 1896. The Democrats had been clobbered in the midterm elections two years prior, so it was hardly a surprise that the Democratic candidate William Jennings Bryan got stomped. McKinley raised the tariff again, which was a standard Republican platform in those days. However, the nations' growing

involvement in the Cuban insurrection against Spain dominated the headlines. The resultant Spanish American War and the annexation of the Philippines were the primary issues of McKinley's first term. To his credit, McKinley handled the situation skillfully.

After he was reelected in 1900, President McKinley began to reconsider the need for high tariffs. There was no need for further protection of American industry. We were producing so much that we needed to export manufactured goods to foreign markets. The government no longer needed funding from tariffs because it was getting plenty of income through excise taxes. He figured

the time had come for lower tariffs and reciprocity. On September 5, 1901, at the Pan American Exposition in Buffalo, New York, McKinley stated, "The period of exclusiveness is past. The expansion of our trade and commerce is the pressing problem. Commercial wars are unprofitable."

It will never be known if McKinley would have been successful in pushing his new plan through Congress. The next day, while visiting another event at the Pan American Exposition, he was shot twice in the abdomen by the anarchist Leon Czolgosz. At first, McKinley seemed to be recovering, but sepsis set in, and he died a week later.

When I was teaching American History, the whole issue of protective tariffs in the late nineteenth century was about as exciting to me (and my students) as watching paint dry. I went over it quickly because it was in the curriculum. I would usually say something like, "The whole thing is a moot point because we have an income tax and a global economy. A trade war is kind of like a nuclear exchange. Nobody comes out the winner. The last time we tried a high tariff was during the Hoover administration. The trade war it started made the Great Depression worse for us and the rest of the world." I was kind of smug back then.

At the time of this writing, it's been a little more than one month since "Liberation Day." The benefits of our current tariff policy and the inevitable trade wars remain to be seen. The world economy now is much different than it was during McKinley's day. By the turn of the twentieth century even McKinley, the "Tariff King," realized that economically, things had changed since the late 1800s. The dawning of the twentieth century accelerated the development of a global economy. Most economists today remain opposed to high tariffs because, as McKinley said in his 1901 speech, "Commercial wars are unprofitable."



DISPATCHES FROM FORT BAYLOR RUGGED GEAR'S NEW FOUR-WHEEL SHOOTING CART

A LITTLE GUN CART HISTORY

ugged Gear has been produc-ing baby stroller-like gun carts for a long time. When I started SASS in 1998, most carts were made out of wood. A few SASS members found used baby strollers and modified them. Eventually shotgun carts were in production. I've seen them rented at public shotgun ranges. They hold a couple of shotguns, usually muzzle down, and several boxes of shotshells. SASS people modified them. Eventually the cart manufacturers found SASS. Two- three- and four-gun carts emerged. Other shotgun sports still use the two- and three-gun ones but the four-gun carts dominate in SASS. Two-gun carts are still used, usually by people who have been using their carts since the 20th century.

Rugged Gear came to my attention with the early four-gun carts. I had been making wooden carts, but when I retired my woodshop wouldn't fit in the trailer behind the motor home. I bought a Rugged Gear cart and wrote about it in The Cowboy Chronicle. It was from a short run of purple ones made for the Dooley Gang. Later I bought the improved version at Winter Range where the dealer, Cowboy Shooters Supply, had a pallet load drop shipped. When wheels made of composite with run flat tires became available, I bought a set at the Rugged Gear tent at Land Run. I had accidentally tested the wire wheels when my cart fell out of the truck wheels down. I would still be using that cart if these four-wheeled ones didn't come out.

One day a large box arrived at my door. It had instructions to "use it, evaluate it, and report to us, and don't tell anyone about it." It came with a form

quite similar to one I had signed when I first got a Top-Secret clearance.

Okay, that last sentence was a slight exaggeration.

But I am good at keeping military secrets. So, if you saw me with it and asked about it and got, "I know nothing—nothing" in a German accent,

now you know why you didn't see any photos of it on my Facebook page.

It was and still is a very good cart with several improvements in addition to the STEERABLE FRONT WHEELS. This is a pretty big deal. I haven't seen anything comparable. It's more stable and maneuverable than a three-wheel cart and easier to maneuver than a cart with two non-steerable front wheels.

The production four-wheeled carts are better. The long wheelbase makes it more stable and gives you more storage room. Early four-gun Rugged Gear carts could tip over backwards.

I sent in reports when anything happened. A 3D printed umbrella mount didn't pass the test. The new mount is better. (I didn't get one with the test cart in time for the test). I didn't like the front storage bag on the long-term test cart. It had a big zipper with no support. It fit in my low clearance truck bed but flopped around a lot. The production cart's new Front Pocket is open topped with dividers. I note that things are easier to find. Planning is needed if you carry a lot of "stuff." Other suggestions included bigger beverage holders on the sides.

I will note that one of my suggestions was that the complete cart and storage compartment needed to fit in short depth pickup truck beds with a hard cover.

It so happens I have one of the trucks meeting that criterion. The Honda Ridgeline is a unit body truck with an independent rear suspension. So, under the bed is room for a lockable gun safe. They don't call it a gun safe, probably for anti-gun publications. They talk about an ice chest for tailgate parties. It has drains in the bottom. If the tailgate is locked (with a hidden button), the key won't get you into "the safe that needs more than a key." My first Ridgeline was totaled in a crash that should have killed me. The fire department had to use the jaws of life to rescue my guns. I made that wild cut-away from the story to explain why it's unique. The new cart will go in and allow the cover to close. There is no room for error. It makes the truck 17" high with enough flex to squeeze the 17.5" cart in place. A lagnappe is that with the lid closed the cart does not

need to be tied down. It works because the lock only snaps into place if you have moved every piece of cloth, etc. to get the lock closed.

The push handle is height adjustable. The handlebar grip is leatherette. My experience with it (on the test prototype) is it's very durable and comfortable.

Reloading Tray in the handle. The pocket is deeper than the previous three-wheel unit. A plywood tray is a low-priced option. I've been using one of those, and I recommend it. The extra depth and the plywood tray make it even more useful.

Durable 1000 Denier Canvas Construction — The material is well tested in several previous models. Shotgun shooters routinely put a case or two in the lower compartment. I've never heard of a failure not caused by some abnormal situation, like a land mine.

Drink Holders on Each Side — The previous models had drink holders, but they fit a 12 oz. beverage can tightly. One of my notes recommended making it fit larger cans/bottles. Now it fits my 12 oz. Maxso Slim Can Cooler (Amazon) and a cooler that is too wide for the cup holder on the door of the truck, and Gatorlyte bottles. It comes with a small cooler, appropriate for a six pack. But the lower storage area handles a big cooler. I use one with several drinks and a lot of blue ice in it. Two bottles of Gatorlyte is needed on 100° Texas days.

It folds and unfolds easily due to easily accessible folding joints, like the previous model. I lubricated the joints with a light coat of Mobil 1 synthetic axle grease, It's appropriately tight when new.

Hand Towel With a Clip to Attach it to the Handle — Note it is not a crying towel. There's no crying in SASS.

Dual Parking Brakes — Previously the brakes were separate, meaning you had to push each one. Now there is a bar between them making setting/releasing much easier. The connector is listed as an option on most models. It can be added to the base model. The brake levers on recent three wheelers were drilled for the connector, so you can add this to them. Older carts might need a hole drilled in each brake pedal.

The patented Hook System holds the guns in place securely and without damage. If in doubt, you can buy Fine Gun Holder covers for \$34.95 per pair.

The rear of the cart incorporates a series of upper pockets including three for shell boxes or personal items. If you

look around a bit you'll find boxes, cases, etc. that fit in the space.

It's all designed around boxes of 25 shotshells. If you use, for example, 100 round MTM cartridge boxes (very popular) and they don't fit, not much of a problem. You can get MTM Shell stackers for about \$9.00 for four of them. You'll never have ammo caught in the rain again.

The shell stackers hold 140+ rounds. A six-stage one-day match will use about 120 rounds. So you can comfortably

plan one box per match day.

The rain cover, optional on some models, is greatly improved with room for the rifle barrels. It fills the big pocket on the back of your cart. You can open it without removing it when it's being used.

AVAILABLE FOUR-WHEEL CARTS

There are basically two carts with a few options.

Three-gun Four-wheel Carts — If you're never going to carry four guns this saves some money. It starts at \$829.99. There are three option packages. With the option getting a 15 percent discount compared to buying them separately. The most complete is the Premier Plus at \$1024.99.

"The Premier Plus Package includes our new water-resistant heavy-duty rain cover item 50677, One Step Brake Bar item 10843, one package Fine Gun Hook Covers item 10823, Wooden Ammo Tray insert item 50774, three-pack Butt Stock Inserts item 10848, and a six can Soft Side Cooler"

Four-gun Four-wheel Carts — These have five packages from \$929.99 to \$1141.99.

The test cart is a Pro Package Plus, which includes the new water-resistant heavy-duty rain cover item 50677 and six

can Soft Side Cooler. I added the \$29.99 four-gun wood tray which I bought from Bullets By Scarlett. I stained it.

The only criticisms that came over the wire and at matches are it is expensive. Welcome to the land of runaway inflation hopefully under control now. When I wrote my book, *Captain Baylor's Big, Bad Book on Cowboy Action Shooting*, the target price was \$35. In mid COVID it came out at \$65 list. I had the choice of using cheaper printing and a cheaper cover or keeping the price and having a product that will last. It has almost 1,000 photos and was designed to last as a reference book. I chose the higher quality.

Rugged Gear also chose quality. Tariffs on the steel parts account for \$70. (Getting the steel parts made in the

U.S. was considerably more expensive, unfortunately.) The quality is such that it would be poor business to use cheap components knowing that most buyers will use it hard and often. SASS shooters don't accept poor quality. It's not a cheap sport \$4000 will begin to buy a basic set of the guns if you want to use them for your entire SASS career. EOT winning costumes often cost as much as a complete set of guns.

RECOMMENDATIONS

If you're an experienced competitor, you know your needs. If you are a beginner, a Harbor Freight folding wagon with a bolt on Rugged Gear gun stand will work for a while. When it doesn't you'll know.

If you don't, then get the item's you're sure of.

DISPATCHES FROM FORT BAYLOR — EXTRA FACTORY SHOTSHELLS GOOD FOR SASS

inding the best factory shotshell for SASS usage has always been somewhat difficult. Our needs are unique. The average sporting goods store or gun shop, I was sad to discover, may never had heard of "Featherlites" or "Low Recoil" loads. Beginners show up with rounds that punish their shoulders and won't come out of the gun without a pry bar.

Factory loads that work very well for SASS do exist — if you can find them. They may all be plentiful where you are, but since COVID I find them elusive, but getting easier. Here are some in reverse alphabetical order:

WINCHESTER XTRA-LITE TARGET LOADS

12 ga, 2-3/4" length, 2-3/4 dram equivalent, 1 oz. of shot, 7-1/2 shot. Red, smooth exterior, low brass. This is noticeably hotter than their AAFL8s., but if you use FL8s, keep a box of these

for that once-a-year match where one or more targets refuse to fall.

WINCHESTER LOW NOISE LOW RECOIL OR AAFL8S, COMMONLY CALLED FEATHERLITES

12 ga., 2-3/4" length, 980 fps velocity, 26 gram (0.9178 oz.) of shot, #8 shot. Red, smooth exterior, low brass. This has been popular with people needing low recoil. Lately there have been complaints about rounds being out of spec and failing checking with a gauge. I was having a string of one stuck hull per match day, sometimes more. I tried all three of my shotguns, all well-prepared with chambers that were smooth, round, and slightly oversized. It wasn't the shotgun's fault. The use of various lubricants and magic elixirs didn't alter the statistic. I run every round through a gauge, such as SliX-

prings' checker/sizer. It helps.

REMINGTON STS LOW RECOIL (ALSO A GUN CLUB LOW RECOIL)

12 ga., 2-3/4" length, 2-1/2 dram equivalent, 1-1/8 oz. of shot, #8 shot. Green, smooth, low brass. Velocity is shown as 1100 fps on the box. The 1-1/8 oz. loads will make more recoil than the lighter Winchesters at similar velocities. I use the same sizer on them. Out of spec rounds are found.

FEDERAL TOP GUN

12 ga., 2-3/4" length, 900 fps velocity, 1-5/8 dram equivalent, 1-1-1/8 oz. of shot, #7-1/2 shot. These are new to me. Ridged exterior, high brass. Normally cases with ridges stick and are hard to eject. This works very well. Not wanting to jinx it, I'll just say stuck cases are not a problem. These are so good they helped me to make the decision to buy shotgun ammo rather than make it. My frustration levels went down immediately. The recoil is heavier than the FL8s, but is manageable. As slow as I am I can follow up pretty quickly. I shot low recoil BP or American Pioneer Powder rounds, a gentler recoil, but I usually couldn't see through the smoke. This smokeless is great at letting me see the targets. Who knew?

DISPATCHES FROM FORT BAYLOR — EXTRA UNIQUETEK ADVANCED SHELLPLATE BEARING KIT FOR DILLON 650/750 RELOADING PRESSES

BACKGROUND

T've known Lee Love at UniqueTek since the 2000 Winter Range. He sells, as said, many unique items. I'm on a planned course to write about products that interest me until I run out. In other words, expect something every few issues.

When I got this, the XL750 had just undergone it's Million round overhaul at the factory. It was very smooth, once in a lifetime smooth. It reminded me of a well-gunsmithed '73 used all the time in matches and is smooth as silk. So I was faced with the decision to test this item and maybe not see any difference, perhaps make things worse, or have no effect. I decided to install it. Afterwards I was still pleasant-

ly surprised at how smooth and light the operation was.

Seriously, I feel the primer sliding into the new Starline brass the bottom of the stroke and at the top a Hi-Tek coated bullet is sliding into the case, another case is being crimped, and the last one falls into the bin. If anything is wrong, I can feel it.

This isn't for everyone. 650s and 750s are very smooth out of the box. It comes with excellent, detailed instructions. Read them-several times. Follow them explicitly. I'll repeat a colonel's instructions to me in Vietnam. "Don't hurry. If you hurry you could get people killed." Later he illustrated it by hurrying and walking into a helicopter blade. Fortunately, with the Dillon, at worst case you can just go back to stock parts.

THE INSTRUCTIONS EXPLAIN THE PROBLEM

"There are several Shellplate bearing kits available that use an axial needle roller thrust bearing with two thrust washers. But they all miss one critical detail. The thrust washers included in the kits are not fixed into position and so are able to rotate. When the thrust washers rotate along with the bearing, it defeats the whole

advantage of using the bearing.

"To function correctly, the thrust washers must be fixed to the Shellplate Bolt and to the top of the Shellplate. It is also not good to use just the bearing

without thrust washers as the hardened needle rollers of the bearing will rapidly wear the Shellplate Bolt and Shellplate. The thrust washers are matched in both material and hardness, to the needle rollers of the bearing, thus preventing wear of the adjoining parts.

"This kit includes six thrust washers, one for the Shellplate Bolt and five more for Shellplates plus a tube of Loctite® 609 Retaining Compound to bond the thrust washers in position."

After spending several hours on this I decided not to include complete instructions. The ones with the kit are excellent. I have some photos to illustrate some of the steps to install it.


THE EL MALO REVOLVER

BY RICOCHET RITTZ, SASS #114134

I Malo is Spanish for the bad, the bad guy, or villain. This handgun is made by Pietta and is imported through Cimarron Firearms Company. MSRP is between \$680-\$740, depending on what configuration you want. It comes in two calibers, .45 Colt and .357/.38. Barrel lengths for this revolver are 4-3/4, 5-1/2, and 7-1/2 inches. The El Malo barrel is octagon shaped. Sights are fixed, blade front sight and a notch for the rear. The frame and hammer are color case hardened steel, while the barrel, back strap, and trigger guard are blued steel. It has a four-position hammer like the original Colt revolvers, which some of us who are traditionalists like. The grip is one-piece smooth walnut and feels great in the hand. Wood to metal finish was a little off with the top of the grip sticking out just past the back of the frame on both sides. This didn't have any effect on the way the gun handled. The hammer feels great pulling it back and as it falls effortlessly into place. The trigger is a little stiff but not bad. I don't have a trigger weight gauge so I won't put a poundage reading on this review. The revolver I tested was the .357/.38 caliber with a 4-3/4-inch barrel.

I used two different .38 loads, one factory and the other reloads. The factory ammo was Browning 130-grain full metal jacket (FMJ) and the reloads were 105-grain lead flat nose (LFN) with 3.5 grains of HP38 powder and a Winchester WSP primer. I shot ten bullets from each type of ammunition. The reloads shot very low. The factory ammo shot low also, but not as much, and had a better grouping. I did alternate between the two when shooting and gave the revolver time to cool down in between. I must say I was a little disappointed in the grouping of the rounds.

The conclusion, as far as Cowboy Action Shooting™ with this revolver, is you should be able to hit your targets with no problem. At seven yards I was shooting paper that was 9" X 9". The





revolver is well balanced. The hammer and trigger pull are fine for an out of the box gun. The smooth walnut grip felt great in the hand and the sight picture was good also. I'm not too keen on the octagon barrel on an 1873 frame, though. To me, it just doesn't look right, almost like the barrel is too big for the frame. But as the old sayin' goes, to each his own. This revolver was fun to shoot regardless of the pattern it put on paper.



TRAINING

ACTION SHOOTING MIND, BODY AND EQUIPMENT

In my competitive shooting career, I have had the privilege to find a mentor who upped my game significantly. I am grateful for his friendship. Over the past few years, I have developed a new friendship and am pleased to pay my training forward by sharing my skills with him. Recently, however, I realized that not only can I share what I was taught. I can also share with him what I have learned.

My mentor taught me technique. He taught fine motor skills. He taught me what equipment works best, but what I had to learn is how the mind and body develop muscle memory.

Starting with equipment, we spend a lot of time and money modifying our guns just to keep up with the competition. I concede that a tricked-out rifle and a strategically polished shotgun are primary tools to meet the demands our categories create. But as a shooter gains proficiency, equipment and shooting category choices will manifest into personal preference. Action work and loading recipes will enhance your abilities, no doubt, but true skill comes from training and refined techniques.

After setting a new world record for a revolver on a plate rack, Jerry Miculek was asked about the performance of his handgun. Jerry replied, "I didn't feel it. My problem is to see. The gun is going to work, I just have to get to the next target."

Discipline of the mind and body must be learned by experience in order to develop skill. Learning these skills is a personal journey. An individual must follow a path to acquire discipline and proper form, which means practice, practice, practice.

Ås I recall statistics, the repetitive execution of a motor skill about thirty times ingrains that pattern to become a habit. These patterns then develop into muscle memory. Perform a motor



skill in an inefficient manner repeatedly and it becomes a poor habit. The problem is, poor habits must be broken and re-learned as proper habits.

When each of us learned to shoot, the potential danger of this new activity was stressed by our teacher(s). Safety was (and is) paramount. This environment puts stress onto new shooters. Concentration on safe practices can invoke muscular stress manifesting itself in the neck and shoulders. Posture is usually rigid. As we evolve to shoot unattended, this rigid stance becomes a learned behavior. When a novice shooter uses a public range, he will have a Range Safety Officer looking over his shoulder ensuring he is not shooting at a pace faster than one shot every four seconds. This is not a training environment that compliments the movement and the pace of action shooting. Few shooters move beyond the punching of holes in paper from an assigned alleyway in front of a bench or table.

In developing the skills for action shooting, I recalled learning in the martial arts that the center of mass of the human body is known as "ki." Ki







is located about two inches below your naval. Proper motion is an extension of energy initiated from ki. As with most sports, a sporting stance centers ki. Knees slightly bent, feet shoulder width apart, hips back, torso slightly forward, head level, weight on the balls of the feet, breathe from the belly. When you assume a sporting stance, it naturally places the consciousness into an alert state giving you a feeling of readiness and control of motion. With this stance, the muscle tension found in the neck and shoulders can no longer reside in this part of the body. Instead, the muscle tension moves to the stronger muscles in the thighs. This stance moves muscle tension and breathing closer to ki.

As the body assumes a state of readiness, one must learn to relax the brain so it can now concentrate on controlling motion based upon muscle memory. (I take a cleansing breath prior to each stage.) For example, I am a trained typist. In a relaxed state, my words flow onto this page. My brain commands words to my fingers as my eyes ensure the words are spelled correctly. I instinctively backspace and correct the wrong letters. It









wasn't always this way. Drill after drill of the proper finger on the proper letter. Initially, my brain typed each letter and space commanding each finger to give me the desired output. Years later, the patterns of suffixes and repetitive words flow from my fingers without conscience thought.

To again quote Jerry Miculek regarding training, "Any athlete has to have a mental program. If you try to make it happen, it'll become mechanical, and the wheels fall off [sic]. I have to be able to see. If I can watch it happen instead of trying to make it happen; it's going to be brilliant."

When exercising muscle memory, with the brain in a relaxed but alert state, your body moves faster than your conscience mind can comprehend to tell it to move. You are in control, but only as much as you command the muscles to implement instinctive patterns in which they are trained to move. In a sense, you are watching yourself perform. Your consciousness is in command of output, but it is only making adjustments to motor functions. Let it happen, don't try to make it happen. Trying to make it happen will bring muscle tension in all the wrong places, especially into your neck and shoulders. Your posture will return to rigid and you will slow down. The wheels fall off.

There is an adage used in our community, "Slow is smooth; smooth is fast." Before you can push the boundaries of your speed, you have to learn to be smooth. Smooth ingrains muscle memory, which then becomes instinctive. Personally, I competed for years trying to "make it happen," battling to try to keep the wheels from falling off. I wasn't fighting the clock as much as I was pushing through muscle tension. As soon as I would leave the loading table, I felt it in my neck and shoulders. My motions were centered in my chest and arms, pushing to fight muscle stiffness and tension centered in my neck and shoulders. My breathing was light and shallow without rhythm. It was a poor habit, difficult to break. It took me years to gradually evolve into relaxation. After finding the ability to relax, it was later that Jerry Miculek's words allowed me to comprehend the path I had taken. He revealed to me that I was now letting it happen instead of making it happen. In retrospect, I had learned to center my ki.

If you are struggling with overcoming the barrier of relaxing the body and mind on the clock, I hope my words can lead you down the path that took me years to discover.

"Well, see, if you take your time... you get a more harmonious outcome" —Wilford Brimley, *Crossfire Trail*.

Sandy and Mike owned and ran Thunderstick Trading Company Ltd. (the gun shop in Tucson) for 30 years. Sandy's love, after her husband and family, was the promotion and production of Bordertown. Starting in 2001 Sandy coordinated the RV parking at Bordertown, then held in Tucson. In 2006 Bordertown moved to Tombstone. Sandy was Treasurer. In 2012, Sandy became President.

Quicksand greeted all who entered the main tent to register for Bordertown like family. Everyone felt welcomed and wanted. She treated any and all shooters as if they were her children. She remembered names, what they did for a living, etc. She managed posses well, making sure folks would "work" together. She also took a special interest in the young shooters, making sure they had the equipment they needed and were on a posse where they'd be taken care of. Shooter prizes were a must. If Sandy thought any of the shooter prizes weren't up to snuff, she'd add a box of shotshells and always kept a couple cases under the table just in case.

Quicksand was instrumental in helping many folks get started in CAS. If they



didn't have or couldn't travel with ammo, she'd help. She'd allow them to have their ammo sent to the gun shop, and she'd deliver it either by hauling it to Bordertown or, if she was going out of town to another match, folks knew they could have their ammo sent to the gun shop and Sandy would bring it to the match.

Quicksand and Pike enjoyed traveling. Whenever they traveled to an out-oftown match they always took in the sights. They would fully immerse themselves into the local culture. Their three grandchildren also shot CAS — Little Bear Tracks, Southpaw Robber, and Spunky Sparky — and they took them to many out-oftown matches. Their favorite out-of-town matches were Gathering of the Posses, Yuma Match Masters, and Railhead.

Outside of Bordertown, Sandy and

Mike fancied dancing. People watching would comment, "Man, they can cut a rug!" The Maverick in Tucson was their favorite haunt.

Sandy appreciated music and enjoyed going to concerts. The one she most wanted to see and the one she missed was Neal Diamond. She had tickets this year to his Tribute Band. She passed away the day of the concert. Her best friend and sister by choice, Gila River Mo, took the tickets and attended with Sandy in spirit.

Sandy and Mike raised three kids, had six total. She cared for her mother in her mother's last years while running the gun shop. She was always active in her family's lives and always active in CAS in one position or another.

RIP Quicksand. You will be missed by all.

He said, "At first I couldn't find "Just what was ailin' you "So I called your wife and then your Pards "And now I have a clue!"



SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

The Cowboy Chronicle welcomes and encourages submissions of articles and match reports from any and all readers.

Please submit articles in MS Word or something compatible. Open Office and Apple Pages (saved as MS Word) are also fine. A count of 500-800 words is a good target to shoot for, but shorter pieces are also fine. Match reports on larger events, like END of TRAIL, Winter Range, and Regional and Divisional matches may run 1000-1500 words if necessary. We will accept lengthier articles, but may choose to break them up into two or more parts to run in consecutive issues, or heavily edit them.

Please do not embed your photos in the Word document. They can be extracted for use in the *The Cowboy Chronicle*, but it can be a chore to do that. Instead, send your photos separately, in one or more emails, as attachments. Three to six photos per email usually works best. It's best to send JPEGs, but other formats are acceptable, and it's best to keep them at about 300 dpi and 3000 pixels (10 inches) on the short side. That size is

ideal and will allow us plenty of leeway when it comes to cropping and adjusting them for publication. Photos should be at least 1000 pixels on the short side to be used for publication. If you're unsure of the size of your pictures, or how to size them, send what you have and we'll adjust them and/or inform you if they're usable.

Usually, two to six photos are sufficient for an article, but we will consider using more for a "big" event, if provided. Photos need not have captions, but captions always make photos more interesting. Ideally, the caption would consist of one or two sentences that say something about the picture that is not obvious and/or is not implicit in the body of the article. "Sam making smoke" is a title but not a caption. "Sam, SASS #XXXXX, shooting his first black powder match; after much deliberation, he decided to give it a try and now he's hooked" is much better. A caption may also serve to let everyone know why the picture is worthy of being published in an international magazine.
